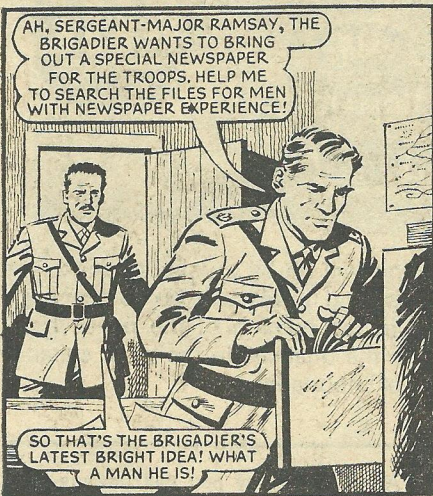


SO, MAJOR BLACKETT, YOU'LL SEE TO THAT, THEN!

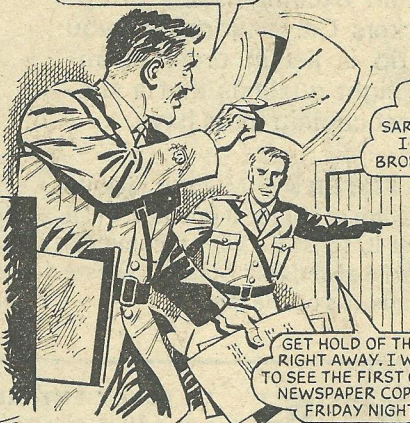

SO THAT'S THE BRIGADIER'S LATEST BRIGHT IDEA! WHAT A MAN HE IS!



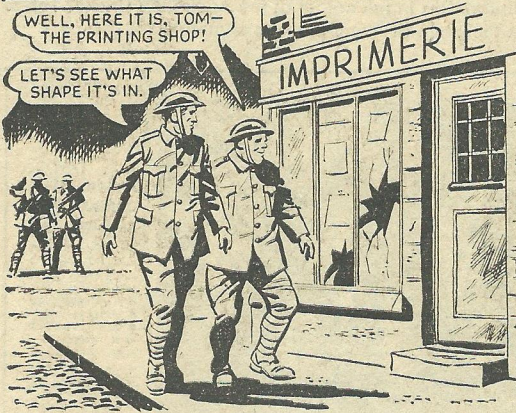
Later.
